ADMISSIONS ARRANGEMENTS FOR SEPTEMBER 2016 - AUGUST 2017

Frieth C.E.C. School has a distinctive Christian ethos which is at the centre of school life. We provide an inclusive, supportive and caring environment, shaped by Christian values, in which children can learn and flourish. We welcome applications from all members of the community without reference to ability or aptitude and irrespective of whether they are of the Christian faith, another faith or no faith, but we expect parents to respect the Christian ethos of our school. Our mission statement is: We are a close Christian community, nurturing, inspiring and celebrating all individuals. Through creative learning we encourage greatness by developing potential without limitations.

The Governing Body of the school, not Buckinghamshire Local Authority (the LA), is responsible for deciding on admissions to the school, but works closely with the LA to coordinate admissions to all maintained schools in Buckinghamshire. Details of the LA arrangements are in the Buckinghamshire booklet, available from the school. This also explains how parents can express a preference for a school and give reasons for that preference. Parents should apply to the local authority in which they live at the time of application (the home LA) which may not be Buckinghamshire. The dates and process of application will be in accordance with the co-ordinated admissions scheme of the home LA. This will be published by the home LA when it has been agreed and will be common to all schools within the home LA. Decisions on which children are to be offered a place will be made by the Admissions Committee of the school. Offers of a place will be made by the home LA on behalf of the Governing Body. Parents (see Note 2) will be given a deadline by which to accept an offer. Applications received after the deadline for receipt will only be considered after all those received by the deadline. This means that if no places are left after considering all the applications received by the deadline, even if you fulfil a higher criterion than that under which places have been offered to other applicants, you will be unsuccessful.

At our school, pupils are admitted to the Reception Year at the beginning of the school year (1 September – 31 August) in which they reach their fifth birthday. The school does not consider earlier entry. Parents whose children were born between 1 September 2011 and 31 August 2012 may apply for them to be admitted to the Reception Year in September 2016. Parents of a child whose fifth birthday falls between 1 September 2016 and 31 March 2017 may request that their child is not admitted until later in the school year 2016/17 (no later than the term [using three term year] after the child's fifth birthday, when s/he reaches compulsory school age). The school will hold any deferred place for the child, although, in the majority of cases, we find that children benefit from starting at the beginning of the school year, rather than part way through it. Until the child reaches compulsory school age, parents also have the right to request that s/he attends part-time. In such a case, the parents should discuss this with the head teacher when accepting the offer of a place.

For children whose fifth birthday falls between 1 April 2017 and 31 August 2017, parents who do not wish them to start school in school year 2016 -17, but to be admitted in September 2017 for the school year 2017 -18, should discuss this with the school at an early stage. They may decide not to apply for a Reception place in September 2016, but to apply in the second half of the summer term 2017 for a year 1 place in September 2017. Parents should be aware that the year 1 group may have no vacancies as it could be full with children transferring from the 2016-17 Reception Year group. Alternatively, they may

decide to apply in the normal round (no later than 15th January 2017) for a Reception Year place in September 2017, but would need to provide strong supporting reasons for seeking a place outside the normal year group.

In all other cases, pupils will be admitted provided there are places available in the relevant year group. The admission number for entry to the Reception Year in September 2015 is 20 and for entry to Year 3 in September 2015 is 2. Year 1 and Year 2 also have 20 places and Years 4-6 have 22 places.

In-year applications (see Note 6) for all year groups for the academic year 2016-2017 will be administered by the school and applications should be made direct to the school.

Requests from parents for places outside a normal age group will be considered carefully, e.g. for those who have missed education due to ill health. Each case will be considered on its own merits and circumstances. However, cases will not normally be agreed without a consensus that to do so would be in the pupil's interests. The governors will ask relevant professionals for their opinion on the case. Those refused places outside the normal age group will be informed of their statutory right to appeal.

Children with Statements of Special Educational Need naming Frieth School will always be admitted. The Governors subscribe to the Fair Access Protocol published by the Local Authority. In the event of there being more applications than places available, they will be considered in the following order of priority:

- Looked-after children and children who were previously looked after, but ceased to be so because, immediately after being looked after, they became subject to an adoption, child arrangements or special guardianship order (see Note 1).
- 2) Children (or a parent see Note 2) living in the catchment area who have exceptional medical or social needs that make it essential that they attend Frieth C.E.C. School rather than any other. These needs must be fully supported by written evidence from the appropriate professional person involved with the family (see Note 3).
- 3) A child with a normal home address (see Note 4) in the catchment area and with a sibling (see Note 5) already in attendance at Frieth School at the time of application and who is expected still to be in attendance at the time of entry to the school or a sibling who has already been offered a place to start in the current academic year.
- 4) A child with a normal home address (see Note 4) in the catchment area and not included in the above numbered categories.
- 5) A child with a normal home address (see Note 4) outside the catchment area and with a sibling (see Note 5) already in attendance at Frieth School at the time of application and who is expected still to be in attendance at the time of entry to the school or a sibling who has already been offered a place to start in the current academic year.
- 6) A child with a normal home address (see Note 4) outside the catchment area and not included in the above numbered categories.

Proximity of the child's home to the main school gate, as measured by a straight line distance, will serve to differentiate within any of the above criteria in the event of there being a greater demand for admission than there are places available, with those living nearer being accorded the higher priority. Measurement will be supplied by Bucks County Council, and will be the distance as set out by Ordnance Survey. In cases where applicants live an equal distance from the school, for example those living in flats or apartments in the same block, the school will use random allocation to decide which child should be offered the place. The process will be conducted in the presence of a person independent of the school.

Multiple Births

Note 1: By a "looked-after child" we mean one in the care of a local authority or being provided with accommodation by a local authority in the exercise of its social services function. An adoption order is one made under the Adoption Act 1976 (Section 12) or the Adoption and Children Act 2002 (Section 46). A 'child arrangements order is one settling the arrangements to be made as to the person with whom the child is to live (Children Act 1989, Section 8, as amended by the Children and Families Act 2014, Section 14). A 'special guardianship order' is one appointing one or more individuals to be a child's special guardian/s (Children Act 1989, Section 14A). Applications under this criterion must be accompanied by evidence to show that the child is looked after or was previously looked after (e.g. a copy of the adoption, child arrangements or special guardianship order).

Note 2: A "parent" is defined in law as either:

- any person who has parental responsibility (defined in the Children Act 1989) for the child, or
- any person who has care of the child.

Note 3: When applying under criterion (2), i.e. exceptional medical or social needs, you must include supporting evidence from an independent professional person who is aware of the situation and supports your reasons for preferring Frieth C.E.C. School. This supporting evidence must clearly demonstrate why the school is the most suitable and must illustrate the difficulties that would be caused if your child had to attend another school. The person supplying the evidence should be a medical consultant, senior health visitor, senior social worker, etc., who is aware of your child's or your own case. The school reserves the right to ask for further evidence or clarification and may seek the advice of appropriate educational professionals where necessary.

Note 4: By 'normal home address' we mean your child's home address. This is your child's permanent address at the time you make your application for a place. It is where you and your child live. A child's home address is considered to be where he or she spends the majority of the school week (Monday to Friday, including nights). We may ask to see official documentation, such as a child benefit book or medical card if there are reasons why a child does not live at his or her parent's address. For example, if he or she is resident with a grandparent, you need to tell us this on the application form. If you do not declare any arrangements like this or use a relative's address for your application, we

may consider that you have made a false declaration and withdraw the offer of a place. Childcare arrangements are **not** sufficient reason for listing another address. The school reserves the right to check the validity of any address given. If you are not sure whether or not you live in the catchment area you can ask the school to check this for you and you will receive a written response. If you are moving into the catchment area we will ask for evidence of your move before considering any application for a place. We need to know that you will be resident in the catchment area on 1 September 2015. If you move later we will still need evidence before considering an application. Typical evidence is a letter from your solicitor confirming that you have a legally binding agreement to buy the house or a formal lease agreement.

Note 5: Sibling refers to brother or sister, half brother or sister, adopted brother or sister, step brother or sister, or the child of the parent/carer's partner where the child for whom the school place is sought is living in the same family unit at the same address as that sibling. In cases where there is one place available, and the next child on the list is a twin, triplet, etc., we would admit both twins (and all the children in the case of other multiple births) even if this meant exceeding the agreed number or number of available places in a year group.

Note 6: by 'in-year applications' we mean applications for admission of a child/children at a time other than the first entry into school as a Rising 5 or five year old or at Junior Transfer level (Year 3).

There are established arrangements for appeals against non-admission. Details are available from the school. It should be noted that, in the event of an unsuccessful appeal against non-admission to the school, the school does not consider any further application in the same school year (1 September - 31 August) unless there is a major change in circumstances e.g. change of address. The school maintains a waiting list for those children who are not offered a place; the order of priority on the waiting list is the same as the list of criteria for over-subscription. No account is taken of length of time on a waiting list. The school periodically seeks confirmation that parents wish a child to be kept on the waiting list.

Applications received 2014/15

For entry to the Reception Year in 2014/15, the school received 46 applications. Twenty children took up places, of which four were in category 2 (in-area with siblings), seven were in category 3 (in-area), five were in category 4 (out of area with siblings) and four in category 7 (out of area).
