

## Primary Sports Premium 2019-2020

**Name of School:** Frieth C.E.C. School

At Frieth CEC Primary School, we recognise the contribution of PE to the health and well-being of the children. We believe that an innovative, varied PE curriculum and a wide range of extra-curricular opportunities have a positive influence on the concentration, attitude and academic achievement of all our children.

Our Primary School Sport's Funding will enable us to continue and extend our provision through employing additional sports professionals, entering into more competitive sports competitions and training our staff to deliver in-house quality PE sessions.

Schools with 17 or more pupils will now receive £16,000 plus £10 per pupil in the academic year. The grant is allocated in two tranches.

### How has the grant been spent?

1.	<p><b>Coaching</b></p> <p><b>£8250 September 2019 – March 2020</b></p> <p><b>£3960 April – August 2019</b></p> <p>This figures includes the costs of festivals, training in the build up to festivals, support for sports day and after school activities</p>	<p>We have continued to use the vast majority of the funding to employ a specialist coaching company who deliver 2 afternoons of multi skills sports teaching and CPD training opportunities for the Foundation, Keystage 1 and Keystage 2, both pupils, teachers and support staff. The desired outcome is to deliver high quality PE lessons, increase knowledge of the PE curriculum, set targets and assess the pupils robustly in PE and ensure differentiated lessons to aid the pupils to fulfil their potential and make rapid progress in PE</p> <p>All teaching staff deliver at least one PE lesson per week. For this academic year, the teaching staff have delivered the core elements of the PE curriculum, particularly building upon the CPD training they received in Dance in the 2018 2019 academic year. There is a full PE progression of skills document and a long term plan for staff to follow.</p>
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		<p>The specialist coaches are employed by ClubSport – a local commercial sports coach provider.</p> <p>The professional sports coaches also deliver an enhanced provision for sports and the PE curriculum. They plan for units of work based within the curriculum that build up to participation in interschool festivals. In 2018 2019 every child in KS1 and 2 had the opportunity to participate in a sporting festival as a result of this provision and until the onset of the pandemic in early 2020, the school was on track to complete the same level of participation.</p> <p>The service level agreement for 2019 2020 also included the costs for running the after school sporting clubs and activities which were being mainly funded by the sports premium (see below) but with very small parental contribution.</p> <p>We rate the quality of the coaching sessions delivered as good. The provider also run quality assurance observations of their staff and feedback their findings to the school. We trust these observations and quality assurance as they are carried out by a former employee of Frieth school who always demonstrated excellence in her role as a teacher and PE lead for the school. We have used the vast majority of our funding to provide two afternoons of teaching, CPD and innovative lessons for the whole school each week. All sessions have a member of the teaching or teaching assistant staff present so that assessment takes place.</p> <p>We have the same specialist coaches providing two lunchtime 'Positive Play' sessions for our Year 5 pupils, which are teaching them games, rules and leadership skills to support the rest of the school during playtimes. The two sessions gives the confidence boost in the early days so that we can avoid some of the issues that can arise with leadership skills.</p> <p>The service level agreement was kept in place for the summer term as we wanted the flexibility to use the provision should schools reopen following the COVID-19 pandemic closure. The company have pledged to provide additional support in the 2020 2021 academic year to make up for missed sessions that have been paid for during the closure. This will be investigated as part of the ongoing service level agreement.</p>
2.	<b>Competition</b>	<p>Part of the service level agreement with Club Sport was the inclusion of sporting festivals. This year every child from year 1 to year 6 has had the opportunity to take part in a competitive festival organised by club sport. As these are interschool festivals, we provided the cost of the school bus transport to enable pupils to attend.</p> <p>We were able to access the initial festivals in the Autumn term before the closure of schools owing to the Pandemic.</p>

3.	<p><b>Health/Physical Activity</b></p> <p><b>£3600 paid to DJ sports (ActivKidz) for funded curriculum enhancement clubs</b></p> <p><b>(Additional costs for curriculum enhancement clubs run by Club Sport were included in the total costs within the Club Sport service level agreement (see above))</b></p>	<p>We have a number of clubs running in school: cross country running, football, cricket, golf, street dance, gymnastics, multi-skills, Activkids, Positive Play Leaders and netball. We would have continued athletics and tennis in the summer term 2020 had the school been open.</p> <p>The clubs in the academic year for 2019 to 2020 have been partially funded using the sports premium to ensure more pupils have access to a greater number of clubs and sporting activities. This has ensured that all the enrichment sporting and activity clubs have had much higher uptake after school, although this was curbed by the Pandemic and the closure of schools. <i>The cost of this provision was expected to be £1950 more but these costs were reduced by the closure during the summer term.</i></p> <p>We have introduced a wider range of Outdoor Adventurous activities with all of KS2 now taking part in orienteering for at least half a term each year.</p>
4.	<p><b>Shared or Single School PE Specialist Teachers</b></p>	<p>We are using the professional coaches from Clubsport for continued staff development.</p>
5.	<p><b>Professional Learning</b></p>	<p>Staff training will be sourced from the local authority and outside agencies in line with the needs of the school.</p> <p>Staff also have regular access to CPD opportunities through the specialist coaching team we have in school and are able to access professional conversations, team teaching and observations to develop their professional skills and knowledge. Staff have provided impact statements and these show that they have been up skilled and are finding the team teaching approach a very useful tool. Clubsport have also been moderated by an outside provider as well as their own in house inspections.</p> <p>Staff have commented that we now have a more enhanced and inclusive curriculum and that their own competence and confidence has improved.</p> <p>Further CPD impeded by Covid-19 Pandemic and school closures</p>

6.	<p><b>Other</b></p>	<p>There has been a positive impact on the whole school as increased participation leads to improved pupil behaviour and attendance in lessons. The parents and carers are happier with the provision for sports through our extracurricular opportunities.</p>
	<p><b>£3768</b></p>	<p>The sports funding was used to purchase a new outdoor learning resource base in the Early Years outdoor area. The works included levelling the old base, re-concreting the area and purchase and installation of new resource base.</p>
	<p><b>£949.61</b></p>	<p>Universal services provided remedial works to our outdoor adventurous and indoor PE equipment based on the annual inspection.</p>
		<p>We have deliberately paid into a scheme, using sports premium funding, so that we can access a greater range of inter school festivals as we have found the previous provision provided via the school games system lacking.</p>
		<p>We aim to use PE to support a cross curricular approach so that children learn through a range of teaching styles and methods.</p>
	<p>Swimming and transport: Spending is <b>£2868.70</b> (paid for from the school budget)</p>	<p>We have changed our swimming provision having decided the previous provider did not offer value for money. The provision for our swimmers in years 4 and 5 is now of a higher standard as are the facilities and overall experience. The participants are assessed and if unable to meet the criteria will be offered further swimming the following year. We are also looking to see whether we use sports premium funding to offer additional swimming lessons to those who, after two terms of provision, then need further booster lessons in year 6. The planned provision was based on one year group attending, however, the school is transitioning to swimming being taught in year 3 rather than year 4, and therefore two year groups attended, bringing the cost above the planned provision.</p>
		<p>The School Travel Plan Committee and the Junior Road Safety Officers run regular 'walk to school' events and all children are encouraged to walk to school by the use of the daily travel tracker to record their journeys and reward badges given for walking to school.</p>

		The PTA run the Frieth Hilly 10k and 5K race in October. Some of our eldest pupils (over the age of 11) enter for the 5K.
	<b>Outstanding actions for 2019 2020 Academic year</b> <b>£3000</b>  <b>£3000</b>  <b>X6 days cover @ £190 per day = £1140</b>	<p>We will continue to update, replace and renew our PE and playtime active equipment on an ongoing basis.</p> <p>We will investigate other outdoor equipment, such as table tennis tables, for the playground.</p> <p>We will utilise some of the sports premium to release teaching staff, enabling them to lead and participate in off-site sporting activities and festivals.</p> <p>The year 5 &amp; 6 pupils will be participating in a week long residential outdoor activity centre in France in July 2021 which was rescheduled owing to the pandemic.</p>
<p><b>What impact has there been on pupil participation and attainment leading to all pupils developing a healthy lifestyle?</b></p> <p>All pupils access at least 2 hours of taught PE every week and in 2019 we introduced the daily mile before school each morning on the playground.</p> <p>We are already seeing a greater number of sporting opportunities within school and a greater number of pupils are now accessing these opportunities.</p> <p>Every pupil in upper KS2 had the opportunity to take part in interschool competitive festivals in the autumn term before the Pandemic closure.</p> <p>Our more talented pupils have shown their abilities through multiskills festivals and during our cross country races. They have also been given opportunities during both lessons and extracurricular sports to further showcase their talents. Affiliation with sporting clubs and associations has enabled gifted footballers to attend county club level training outside of school.</p> <p>The pupils have had a wide range of opportunities and there is a high level of participation in sport. The pupil's enjoyment is shown through their positive attitudes and regular participation in our lessons and extracurricular sports.</p> <p>Of the 50 off site, extracurricular and enrichment events and visits recorded on Evolve over the academic year to June 2019, 40 were PE and sports related activities – 80%. This is equivalent to 1.1 off site sporting or Physical Education activities per school week. This level of participation was planned for 2019-2020 but was curtailed by the pandemic closure.</p>		

The pupils demonstrate a good level of physical fitness and most understand the importance of this for their long-term health. We still need to make more efforts to promote a more holistic healthy lifestyle and this is an area for development.

We have seen data at the end of academic year 2018 2019 showing excellent attainment in PE however, the data for 2019 2020 is incomplete owing to the closure of schools. We will be looking at how to continue this by careful spending of future Sports premium spending to support any catch up or health issues that may be identified when schools reopen.

The year 5 and 6 pupils, through the Positive Play Leaders course and House Captain roles, have acquired the skills to organise sports and physical activity for others.

The children have provided impact statements once they have participated in additional sporting activities and the overwhelming response is positive.

	<b>This would leave planned overspend of £750.95 which can be covered by reducing the Equipment spend.</b>
<b>Coaching £12210.00</b> <b>Club Sport £5550</b> <b>Activkidz</b>	<p>We plan to continue our association with Club Sport in enhancing the curriculum with specialist coaching leading towards participation in festivals and CPD for teaching and support staff. We also plan to continue to subsidise all after school sporting and active clubs to ensure that pupils are able to access all clubs regardless of financial considerations.</p> <p>We are currently working on a plan for the service level agreement to also support and provide additional enhanced sporting opportunities for the Frieth Falcons wrap-around care facility for three afternoons per week.</p>
<b>Swimming and transport</b>	We will continue to fund the travel and swimming coaching within our curriculum entitlement from the school budget. The school feels very strongly that pupils and parents should not be asked to contribute financially to an area that is a statutory part of the PE curriculum.
